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#### Principal's Corner

Welcome back! We hope you had a restful break and had chance to enjoy the holidays. Now that 2018 has finally arrived this is an excellent time to "think positive" and do some planning for a happy and successful new year. Our staff and students have had time to relax since the busy weeks preceding the holidays and now it is time to "hit the books" again. Our teachers have exciting lessons and activities planned for the weeks ahead as they work to achieve classroom goals.

A new year always gives us the opportunity to reflect upon what we have done well and what we can do better. Have you been trying to figure out a new year's resolution? If the answer to the question is yes, I have a great suggestion for you. How about setting plans to help your children experience greater school success in 2018? Here are some ideas to be sure your child is successful at Golden Empire:

- 1. Monitor your students' school work. One way to do this is to have them check in with you after school and share how their day went. A good opening question to help them communicate about this is to ask, "What did you learn in school today?" If you get a vague answer, follow-up by asking them about specific subjects such as: math, reading, or science. Another important way to monitor their work is to have them share any corrected school papers they brought home and discuss them together. You can further monitor by checking on their homework. While parents should never do homework for their young people, it is sound practice to help them if they are struggling. Check it over for them once they are finished.
- 2. Make sure your children get to school. The more students are in school, the higher their achievement. Children cannot learn if they are not in school. In addition, poor attendance causes students to get behind in their learning and catching up can be very difficult when they return. In fact, poor attendance is often the first step to students being unsuccessful at school.
- 3. Reward their efforts. Rewarding students for high grades is not as effective as rewarding them for their effort. Students are always trying and want to make you proud. Therefore, the best way to motivate further effort is to notice it, to praise it, and to reward it.
- 4. Talk up the idea of going to college. I know your students are in elementary school, but this should start at a very young age. As a staff we are always talking about where we went to school and how we benefitted from college. For students to be successful it takes more than a high school diploma. In the 21<sup>st</sup> century, almost all students need a college degree or advanced license to ensure a successful life. Having students set higher education as a target early in their lives will help them set ambitious goals for their academic progress as they proceed through school.
- 5. Finally, be involved! How important is parent involvement in their children's education? Study after study shows that it may be the top factor leading to student success. At Golden Empire, we offer many opportunities to be involved in your student's education. Please join us whenever you can

Families, we appreciate your help in supporting our Golden Empire teachers by encouraging students to work hard and stay focused. This is what makes Golden Empire one of the top ten performing schools in the school district!

#### We Are A Leader in Me School!

As shared in the October newsletter, Golden Empire is in the 2<sup>nd</sup> year of implementing The Leader in Me program (TLIM) where students are taught and practice the 7 Habits of Highly Effective People. TLIM program empowers young people to make positive, effective, and responsible choices by introducing and reinforcing the 7 Habits, a set of leadership and life skills from Stephen Covey's book The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People. TLIM focuses on personal leadership, provides students with activities that will help them learn practical character and life skills that will lead to those positive choices. The staff at Golden Empire has made the commitment to model and implement the 7 Habits of Highly Effective People in order to provide a caring and nurturing environment for our students.

Each month we will focus on one of the seven habits to help our families become more familiar with the habits. Last month we introduced Habit 2-Begin With The End In Mind. We will continue with Habit 3.



#### **Habit 3 - Put First Things First**

"He who fails to plan, plans to fail."

Do you ever feel like you have too much to do and not enough time? What do you do when you have too much to do and not enough time? Is it possible to do it all?

Habit 3 is Put First Things First – "I plan for the important." This habit is about recognizing what is important, prioritizing time, and organizing tasks so we don't have to be stressed constantly. Someone who puts first things first says, "I spend time on things that are most important. This means I say no to things I know I shouldn't do. I set priorities, make a schedule, and follow a plan. I am disciplined and organized."

#### Ways to Apply at Home

- Priority Sort Game: Let your child pretend to be your boss. You went golfing/skiing/to the movies. Explain why your report wasn't in on time. Now you be the teacher and let your child explain how they played instead of doing their homework. Now role-play where you each did your work and studied before you played. Discuss the results and how it feels when we prepare. A good point is how much more we can enjoy our play if we aren't worried about the things we haven't done.
- <u>Planning Helps Us Succeed</u>: Show your child what you use to organize your time and tasks. It is a simple "To Do" list? Calendar? Digital Organizer? Help them create a list of things that need to be done in the week. How can tasks be broken down by day? Write it out. Small children can use pictures. Older kids and teens can plan times of day for tasks and include time for leisure activity as well.
- <u>Family Time</u>: Nothing is more important than our families. Set aside Family Time each week. Let kids help plan the activities. Card and board games are a great way to interact. Go for a walk. Plan and fix a meal together. Visit the library or zoo. Look at old family photos. Protect this time and commit to strengthening your family. Don't be discouraged if it doesn't go smoothly the first few times. Keep trying.

#### **Words to Use**

- "How can we plan to make sure your (homework/chores/project) is completed on time?
- "Our family is important and I would like to spend time with you. What would be a good activity for us to do together?"
- "Which is more important? X or Y?"
- "I bet you feel really good/grown up/proud to have completed \_\_\_\_\_."
- "Thank you for putting first things first.
   It is so great to know I can count on you."
- "Let's talk about this. Did you really think \_\_\_\_\_ was the most important thing?"
- "I understand (your video game) felt very urgent, but was it really more important than (keeping your agreement to unload the dishwasher)?"
- "How can we plan better for next time?"
- For teens/older kids: "What are some things that just waste your time? What can you do about that?"

#### Future Skills That Can Be Learned by Putting First Things First

- Demonstrate time management skills
- Cultivate a strong work ethic, flexibility, and adaptability
- Develop intrapersonal skills of self-management
- Be accountable and responsible for action and results
- Begin to cultivate analytical skill

#### The Importance of Goal Setting and The Leader in Me Program— Ensuring Student Success!

**GOAL SETTING** 



Involving students in goal setting yields powerful results! We see students as young as four or five years old setting and achieving goals in literacy, math, attendance, behavior, and leadership. Once a student sets a goal with his or her teacher, the essential question becomes "What will it take to achieve that goal?"

In Leader in Me Schools, we teach students to set "Wildly Important Goals," or WIGs. WIGs are the vital few goals that must be accomplished in order to be successful. Another way to think about the "G" in WIG is gap. "In what area is there a gap between where I am now and where I need to be?" That's where a WIG would be created.

A WIG is expressed in a statement that is specific, measurable, and time-bound. For example, "Learn all multiplication facts from the 3's through the 6's by December 15." Having a specific goal helps students see where they need to be and by when. After a WIG is identified and written, students often don't know where to begin. Breaking a large goal into actionable steps relieves this confusion. We called those actionable steps lead measures.

In the education world, we have formative, interim, and summative assessments. WIGs can be compared to summative assessments. They measure performance after the fact. Lead measures are like interim assessments. They help a student assess progress toward the WIG and make course corrections, if necessary.

A potential lead measure for the WIG concerning multiplication facts is "Study my multiplication facts at home for 20 minutes, 5 days a week." This measure would be tracked daily to see if progress is being made. Focusing on these lead measures will help the student stay on track to achieve the overall reading goal and evaluate progress along the way.

Students can sometimes be unsure how to achieve a long-term goal. When these goals are broken into small steps based on lead measures, it helps them see their progress along the way and ensure success in the long run.

Meeting with your child's teacher will build strong parent-teacher partnerships. We must work as partners to reach our common goal of helping your child receive the best education!

#### Help Us Keep The Focus!

Is your student receiving after school tutoring? If so, please help the student's teacher by limiting interruptions during the tutoring session. Tutoring is an intensive process— each interruption diminishes the instructional quality and time. Please pick up your student at the designated time and have him or her stay the



entire length of the tutoring period. Families and teachers, while working as partners, can best succeed in helping students academically and socially.

#### Receive Weekly Updates and Emergency Messages

Did you know that the school sends out a weekly email message with the week's school events? If you are not receiving these emails, we do not have your current **CALIFORNIA** email address. Also, EDUCATION CODE 49408 states "For the protection of a pupil's health and welfare, the governing board of a school district will require the parent or legal guardian of a pupil to keep current at the pupil's school of attendance, emergency information including the home address and telephone number, and business address telephone number of the parents or guardian, and the name, address and telephone number of a relative or friend who is authorized to care for the pupil in any emergency situation if the parent or legal guardian cannot be reached."

Golden Empire requires parents/guardians to update students' emergency cards when there is a change of email, telephone numbers or address. When the school sends out Infinite Campus messages or emergency alerts to all parents, the messages are sent to the phone numbers you provide us on the emergency card. Messages are undeliverable to "bad numbers" or email addresses.

Parents/Guardians: It is very important that you do not leave an important message that requires immediate attention on the office voicemail, as we do not want your message to go without the proper attention. We are asking that you call back later and speak to someone in the office. Thank you for your cooperation!

## ATTENDANCE MATTENDANCE MATTERS

Did you know that two missed days of school a month adds up to being a half of year behind by the time the student reached 4<sup>th</sup> grade? And once a child falls behind, s/he rarely catches up.

#### Did you know...

- Starting in Kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10% (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just 1 or 2 days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences can affect the whole classroom as the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch-up.
- Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so students learn right away that going to school on time and every day is important. Good attendance will help children do well in high school, college, and at work.

#### What can you do...

- Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- Lay out clothes, pack backpacks and lunches the night before.
- Keep students home if they are truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomachache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, the school principal, or other parents for advice on how to make your child feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session.

Golden Empire recognizes our students with excellent attendance. Perfect Attendance (100% present at school) means no excused or unexcused absences for any period during the school day (excluding school field trips). Students meeting these requirements will be recognized at our trimester Awards Assemblies and at our Perfect Attendance Ice Cream Socials.

#### FAQs About School Choice, Open Enrollment & Permits

Spread the word to all of your friends that Golden Empire rocks! With Golden Empire's focus on academics, technology and our new The Leader in Me program, there is little doubt that we are one of the school district's educational gems and a positive choice in your child's education. With Open Enrollment February 7-21, invite friends and acquaintances to visit Golden Empire and seriously consider joining the Golden Empire family. If you have any friends or neighbors living in the Sacramento City Unified School District, be sure to let them know that they, too, can apply to attend Golden Empire, even if they live outside of our school boundaries.

Open Enrollment is an opportunity for each student who lives within the district boundaries to apply for enrollment in any participating school within the district. This allows parents to permanently select a school in which they want their child to attend.

A permit is available on an annual basis for parents to select a school that is not their "home school." Agreement must be made with the in-coming school principal. This may or may not happen depending on the schools' enrollment. If there is agreement, a permit is then signed. Dr. Eister is always accepting permits for families who want their students at our school due to our excellent programs and high expectations for academics and behavior. Please contact the Enrollment Center at 916.643.2400 for the dates permits will be accepted this year.
