

As our Golden Empire leaders continue to progress we (the students and teachers) are excited and happy to share the news with you at conference time. And remember, your student will be leading much of the conference, so s/he is expected to attend the conference, also.

Speaking of conferences, have you heard about the Home Visit Program? Home visits are just that—a visit by 2 teachers/staff members to the student's home in the hope of increasing connections between school staff and students, in your community. Golden Empire is proud to be a partner with the California Home Visit Program, a program in 12 states, nationally. The goals are simple: to increase communication between the home and school and build relationships. This visit can also help teachers have a better understanding of the various strengths and challenges faced by each student and to meet the student and their family in a relaxed setting. Ideally home visits occur before the school year begins, but anytime is a good time for a home visit. Our teachers who are our Golden Empire Home Visit ambassadors are Mrs. Bone, Mrs. Moore, Mrs. Randazzo, Ms. Reynolds, Ms. Stadel and Mr. Mitchell. These teachers have already visited over 30 homes, and more are being scheduled. Will you and your child want a home visit? Read Across America is an initiative on reading created by the National Education Association. A major component of the project is National Read Across America Day, an observance in the United States held on the school day closest to March 2, the birthday of Dr. Seuss. Read Across America Day is a day where reading is celebrated by everyone. It is also the birthday of a very famous author, Dr. Seuss, whose real name was Dr. Theodor Seuss Geisel.

Dr. Seuss was an American writer, poet, and cartoonist. Of course we mostly know him by the many children's books he wrote and illustrated. Dr. Seuss wrote over 60 children's books including Green Eggs and Ham, The Cat in the Hat, The Lorax, How the Grinch Stole Christmas, and One Fish Two Fish Red Fish Blue Fish. In his early years he also worked as an illustrator for advertising campaigns, most notably for Standard Oil and as a political cartoonist. During World War II, he worked in an animation department of the United States Army. Dr. Seuss was born on March 2, 1904 in Springfield, Massachusetts and died in 1991 in California.

Did you know that Dr. Seuss was a perfectionist in his work and would sometimes spend up to a year on just one book? It was not uncommon for him to throw out 95% of his material until he settled on a theme for his book.

So on March 2 we celebrate the joy of reading and Dr. Seuss' birthday. We hope you take a few moments and pick up a great book. Just know that "Today is your day. Congratulations! You're off to great places, you're off and away. Today is your day. Your mountain is waiting. So, get on your way!"

Happy Birthday, Dr. Seuss! And Happy Read Across America Day!



It's Time for Student-Parent-Teacher Conferences!

What are student-led conferences? The basic concept: students lead the conferences about their academic progress. They take ownership of their learning experience, sitting at the table with parents and teachers. Students generally share their body of work through portfolios and work samples and at Golden Empire, their Leadership Notebook. Golden Empire is proud to implement student-led conferences, allowing our students to show their leadership traits and take ownership of their learning!

What is a Student-Led Conference?

A student-led conference is a preplanned meeting in which students demonstrate responsibility for their academic performance by providing a review of their work for parents and teachers. The students lead the conference by presenting work samples and discussing their learning. Student-led conferences differ from the traditional parent/teacher conferences:

- Students participate in all stages of the conference. They prepare and organize work samples, use checklists to demonstrate new learning, present their Leadership Notebook and plan next steps.
- Students lead the conversation to show what they have learned. They receive feedback from their parents and teacher about strengths and goals (WIGs) for improvement.
- Student-led conferences benefit students, parents, and teachers.
- Students take more ownership of their learning.
- Parents and students have open communication about their WIGs, academics, behaviors, and other important decisions in life.
- Teachers establish a stronger working relationship with parents and students.

What is the Role of the Student? Students lead the conference. With the help of their teacher, students:

- Collect work samples to share with their parents.
- Review their work with the teacher and think about learning goals/WIGs.
- Share and discuss learning with their parents.
- Identify strengths and learning goals/WIGs with parents and teachers.
- Connect their learning to long-term career goals.
- Determine next steps to improve learning.

What is the Role of the Parent?

- Parents participate as active listeners and as advocates for their child.
- Prepare a list of questions for discussion.
- Encourage their child's involvement in the learning process.
- Provide encouragement, praise, and reinforcement.
- Assist their child in identifying strengths and learning goals/WIGs.
- Work with their child and teachers to determine the next steps for learning.
- Discuss the long-term value of their child's engagement in learning.
- Continue to review new goals/WIGs and the next steps for learning with their child

What is the Role of the Teacher? Teachers help students prepare for the conference. They:

- Guide students in the collection of work samples and review of learning goals/WIGs.
- Review the student's Leadership Notebook and learning goals/WIGs.
- Explain the conference as a learning process to parents.
- Act as a guide and offer feedback.
- Identify new learning goals/WIGs with students and parents.
- Inquire about students' longterm career goals.
- Assist students and parents in determining the next steps for learning.
- Provide feedback to students and parents about the conference process.

We look forward to seeing our families at Spring Conferences! Remember to have your student attend so s/he can lead the conference.

Make the Most of Student, Parent, & Teacher Conferences

Student-Parent-Teacher conferences are great opportunities for students and teachers to focus entirely on communication. Here are some helpful tips that will make the most of your student-parent-teacher conference:

- * Bring your student! Teachers will have your child lead the conference. Your child knows the routines and her/his strengths and areas for improvement. Let her be a part of this important meeting!
- ★ Learn about your child's progress. It's important to find out how your child is progressing academically as well as how he interacts with his peers, if he participates in class and if he is well behaved. Listen carefully to what your child's teacher says, and ask yourself if you note similar patterns at home.
- ★ Share your insights with your child's teacher. A conference is a good opportunity to hear from your child's teacher, and you can give the teacher valuable information that could help your child learn more effectively.
- ★ Discuss your child's strengths and challenges. Through comparing areas where your child excels with areas in need of improvement, you can identify ways to support your child's learning at home.
- ★ Ask questions—of your student and the teacher. This is one of the most important aspects of a successful conference. Such as: How much time should my child spend on homework each night? How can I reinforce classroom lessons at home? What are some activities, games or other strategies that I can use to further my child's learning at home? How can I stay connected? What are some ways I can keep track of my child's progress, assignments and activities?

Do your best to make the most of your student-parent-teacher conference. The more informed you become, the better you, your child and your child's teacher can work together as a successful team.

Preparing for Spring State Testing—The CAASPP

California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress

The California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress, or CAASPP, is the state academic testing program. CAASPP is a system intended to provide information that can be used to monitor student progress and ensure that all students leave high school ready for college and career. The CAASPP includes computer adaptive tests in English–language arts and mathematics as well as paper-based tests for 5th grade science (part of the old STAR system, which are state-normed).

What are the Smarter Balanced Assessments?

The Smarter Balanced assessments are computer-based tests that measure student knowledge of California's English language arts/literacy and mathematics standards. Smarter Balanced Assessments are part of the testing program called the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP).

What will the Smarter Balanced tests measure?

Smarter Balanced tests provide one measure of student knowledge of the subject matter, critical thinking, analytical writing, and problem solving skills they need to prepare for and succeed in today's world. These assessments provide important information as to whether students are on track to pursue college and career by the time they graduate from high school. The tests provide timely and actionable student information so that teachers and schools can adjust and improve teaching.

When will we test at Golden Empire?

Lessons learned from last year's test will help ensure a successful implementation of the CAASPP system this school year. Golden Empire students will take the CAASPP tests in grades 3 - 6 in April and May 2019. Students will not be testing this entire time span—each grade level will test for approximately one week, total. An exact schedule will be sent home soon.

What about 5th graders taking the Science test?


California Science Tests (CAST) will "count" this year. All students enrolled in 5th grade will be administered the science test. This new assessment is aligned with the California Next Generation Science Standards.

How can I learn more about these tests?

To learn more about these tests, visit CDE's Test Score Guide Web site at http://www.testscoreguide.org/ca, which provides informative guides and test score descriptions as well as sample test items at different levels of difficulty. Another great resource are the Practice and Training Tests, which can be found on the CDE's Smarter Balanced Practice and Training Tests Web page at http://www.cde.ca.gov/ta/tg/sa/practicetest.asp. Here, parents can experience the kinds of questions that students will encounter on the tests.

Will parents/guardians receive individual score reports?

Following the spring 2019 testing, students will receive individual score reports. Student score reports will be sent home to parents and will include an overall score, a description of the student's achievement level for English–language arts and mathematics, and other information.
