Stay Informed!

We Need Your Email & Telephone Numbers Did you know that the school sends out a weekly email message with the week's school events? If you are not receiving these emails, we do not have your current email address. Also, CALIFORNIA EDUCATION CODE 49408 states "For the protection of a pupil's health and welfare, the governing board of a school district will require the parent or legal guardian of a pupil to keep current at the pupil's school of attendance, emergency information including the home telephone address and number, and business address and telephone number of the parents or quardian, and the name, address and telephone number of a relative or friend who is authorized to care for the pupil in any emergency situation if the parent or legal guardian cannot be reached."

Golden Empire requires parents/guardians to update students' emergency cards when there is a change of email, telephone numbers or address. When the school sends out Infinite Campus messages or emergency alerts to all parents, the messages are sent to the phone numbers you provide us on the emergency card. Messages are undeliverable to "bad numbers" or email addresses.



What are Brag Tags?

We Are A Leader in Me School!

As shared in the October newsletter, Golden Empire is in the 2nd year of implementing The Leader in Me program (TLIM) where students are taught and practice the 7 Habits of Highly Effective People. TLIM program empowers young people to make positive, effective, and responsible choices by introducing and reinforcing the 7 Habits, a set of leadership and life skills from Stephen Covey's book <u>The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People</u>. TLIM focuses on personal leadership, provides students with activities that will help them learn practical character and life skills that will lead to those positive choices.

Each month we focus on one of the seven habits to help our families become more familiar with the habits. Let's review Habit 1.



Habit 1 is Be Proactive—"I am in charge of me."

"Some people make things happen, some watch things happen, while others wonder what has happened." ~Proverb

Understanding the Habit: To be proactive means to take responsibility for your choices and behaviors. It sounds like, "I am a responsible person. I take initiative. I choose my actions, attitudes, and moods. I do not blame others for my wrong actions. I do the right thing without being asked, even when no one is looking."

Skills that can be learned by being proactive:

- Develop motivation; take pride in work.
- Act responsible toward self, family, school,
- community, nation, and the world.
- Show initiative and entrepreneurism.
- Use unique talents and abilities to their fullest.
- Think about choices, be accountable and
- responsible for actions and results, and understand

that choices affect others.

Family Activities to Help Learn the Habit

Proactive People:

Take responsibility for their choices.
Take initiative to make things happen.
When things don't go their way, they aren't happy, BUT they stay calm.

Reactive People:

Make choices based on feelings, moods & emotions.
Wait for something to happen to them.
Explode when things don't go

• Explode when things don't go as planned.

Most of us react to a situation immediately, without taking time to think about the results of our actions. Part of being proactive is being able to stop and think before we act. With your child, do some role-playing to practice the skill of stopping and thinking in different situations. Your goal in these role plays is to encourage your child to stop and think before reacting.

1. In this role play, you should play the part of your child's friend - Say that you have a new best friend who lives close to your house and you don't want to play with him or her anymore. Apologize and then wait for your child's reaction.

2. In this role play, you should be your child's sibling. - Tell your child that you broke his or her favorite toy by accident. Tell him or her that you don't think it's a very big deal because he or she has many toys.

3. In this role play, you should play the part of your child and your child should play the part of you. - Tell your child that you are "sooooo bored" and there is nothing fun to do. Complain that no one wants to play and that he or she (as a parent) needs to amuse you.

Older children begin to rely more and more on their friends. They can allow a rude comment by a friend to ruin their whole day, and are easily led into misbehavior by a peer group. As a parent, it's important to help your child understand the importance of taking responsibility for his or her own life and choices.

1. Make a pact with your child to together stop an unhealthy habit. Identify the habit you want to stop (smoking, overeating, watching too much TV, not exercising, etc.) and choose a start date, and end date, and progress check---in dates along the way. Explain to your child that research shows it takes a full 21 days to start a new habit or stop an old one, so it's important not to get discouraged or give up too quickly.

2. Have a discussion with your child about the things he or she would be willing to stand up and fight for in the face of peer pressure. Tell your child you don't want him or her to tell you what he or she thinks you want to hear. You might try role-playing this so your child can be prepared to stand up to a friend or group if needed.

What Parents Need to Know About Cyberbullying

Online bullying is a reality for today's teens and tweens and it shouldn't be ignored or minimized. By: Christina Tynan-Wood

Cyberbullying looks like this:

- Someone posts a photo to Instagram and is told by hundreds of users that they are fat or ugly.
- A Facebook post is attacked for no apparent reason, first by one and then by all of the poster's 'friends.'
 Someone takes an embarrassing photo of someone else and posts it to social media where everyone comments, insults, and points out their flaws.
- One person is publicly excluded from gatherings.
- A crowd singles out someone to harass on social media because of race, sexual orientation, or disability.
- A kid meets a stranger online is hounded and harassed by them.

From the moment they engage with the internet, kids are subject to criticism and character assassination from their peers and strangers. When it happens, it's a form of psychological bullying that has a host of repercussions that parents need to be aware of.

Today's parents know that bullying is a serious matter. "Bullying, long tolerated by many as a rite of passage into adulthood, is now recognized as a major and preventable public health problem, one that can have long-lasting consequences," reads an in-depth May 2016 report from the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine. "Those consequencesfor those who are bullied, for the perpetrators of bullying, and for witnesses who are present during a bullying event—include poor school performance, anxiety, depression, and future delinquent and aggressive behavior."

Unlike the in-person bully, the cyberbully is not limited by school hours, proximity, or physical strength. Their domain extends everywhere tweens and teens live online—Instagram, Twitter, Facebook, Snapchat, Tindr, Omegle, YouKnow, and others. For kids raised on social media, the bullying that happens online is every bit as real as bullying that happens in person. And unlike encounters with in-person bullies, there is no escaping online interactions. Cyberbullying can reach kids anywhere, even at home or other places they should feel safe.

The National Education Association estimates that 20-25% of adolescents have been bullied via their cell phone or the Internet. An August 2016 study from Microsoft and the National Cyber Security Alliance (NCSA) found that 39% of online teens report that someone has been mean or cruel to them online or via apps in the past year. According to the victims, those messages were about something the teen said or did (52%), their appearance (45%), their sexual orientation (27%), their gender (25%), or their race or ethnicity (24%).

And while we might be more concerned about the possibility of a stranger targeting or bullying a child online, cyberbullying usually happens between kids who know each other, were once friends, or who dated, according a study by the American Sociological Association.

As social media tools continue to expand at a rapid rate, monitoring your child's online interactions becomes more and more difficult. Some parents ask for their kids' logins for social media or follow them in the apps they use. Tools such as Visr or Bark can be helpful for monitoring phone and social media use, and will alert parents if indicators of bullying occur. But they aren't foolproof.

And forbidding your child from using social media is not likely to protect them. According to the Microsoft NCSA study, 60% of teens say they have an online account their parents are unaware of (though only 28% of parents think their kids have one they don't know about).

"If parents believe cyberbullying is occurring, there are a few things they can do," says Jennifer Hanley, Director, Legal and Policy at the Family Online Safety Institute. "They can try to address it with parents of the other student if they feel comfortable with that route. They can also help their child report it on the social platform where it took place. They may want to do a screen capture of the bullying behavior and then block the user or report it to the social network when it is something they can't handle."

According to the Microsoft NCSA study, only nine percent of teens say they would talk to their parents if they were having problems online. Forty percent said their first call for help would be to a friend. Michael Kaiser, Executive Director of NCSA, points out that this is a great opportunity start to the conversation by talking to your child about the issue in terms of how they might advise a friend, rather than putting the focus on their own life. "Parents need to help kids strategize about what to do when bad things happen online. They also need to help kids build up resilience so that bullying isn't so devastating. And, if we know that the teens will likely be called upon to help a friend, this is an opportunity to talk to teens about what to do when that call comes."



Remember to Sign-In When Entering the Instructional Area



Keeping safety at the forefront at Golden Empire, remember to always sign-in at the front office before entering the school grounds during school hours. Most of our families are well aware of this policy, but it is just a good reminder, as this policy is enforced by Penal Code 627.2. This

regulation is to ensure our students and staff are always safe, and to ensure we always know who is on campus in case of an emergency. When you sign in, we will be asking you to wear a visitor's label showing that you have registered in the office. While this is not a new policy, we just have to remind everyone to take this extra step. We appreciate your help and understanding.

Every Day Matters!

It is extremely important that students are at school on time every school day. Our curriculum is challenging, lessons are tightly spaced, and teaching moves very quickly. When students are absent, come to school late, or leave school early, the lessons they miss cannot be made up completely—their education, schoolwork, and test performance reflect the missed learning experience. (And our school funding is based on attendance!)

Please call our 24 hour attendance line at 395.4580 option 1 to report your student's absence. You may also use our electronic absence form found website: on our goldenempire.scusd.edu. If s/he will be absent for more than a day call the school and have your child's teacher prepare a make-up packet. Please call by 12:00 pm and pick up no later than 3:30 from the school office. If your child will miss more than 2 weeks, inform us so we prepare an individual study packet. can Otherwise, you could be in jeopardy of your student being labeled as truant.

If you take your child to a medical appointment please be sure to get an office note to excuse his/her absence. You can also fax this note to us at 228-5838.
